2011 Reunion Details - Branson MO.

A Great New Year to all USS Walke shipmates, I'm writing to inform everybody of the details of this years' reunion in Branson. The dates are from October 16th through the 21st. This is a beautiful time of year for this area and peak time for fall foliage. It also is just prior to the beginning of the Christmas rates for hotels and shows making it a little more affordable. And, in order to be even more affordable, the group activities were scaled back in order to offer more individual choice.

Making all your reservations for the hotel and the activity package is so easy. A website has been put together specifically for our reunion by Pam Brown of Gatherings Plus, our local contact in Branson. Please go to: <http://www.reunionproregistration.com/usswalke.htm>. For those who do not use the internet, the information you need to make reservations and sign up for the reunion activity package is at the end of this letter.

We will welcome everyone to the Branson Towers Hotel on October 16, 2011 in the Hospitality Room just off the main foyer. There will be a Welcome Aboard reception with assorted sandwiches, salads, veggie trays and desserts, along with the open bar for liquid refreshments. There, you will also receive your welcome packets and any last minute information for the reunion.

Speaking of the Hospitality Room...we will have a **silent auction** in that room, so everyone bring an item for that. Please keep in mind that some folks may be flying in and might have limited luggage space for items they want to bid on. Also, we will need to collect donations for the bar refreshments and I have added a form to send to Richard for those contributions. That form is at the end of the reservation information.

- Monday**, we will board coaches to take a tour of Branson and other sites in the vicinity, and do a little shopping at Branson Landing. We will also eat lunch there. Then, we will be off to see the Acrobats of

China and finish our day with dinner and show at Clay Cooper's Theater, two of the best shows in Branson.

- **Tuesday and Wednesday** you'll be able to take some time on your own to catch your choice of shows or attractions of your choice. Pam has offered many shows at reduced pricing on the website and we highly recommend taking advantage of this opportunity. One note about Wednesday morning...our annual business meeting will be held in the Hospitality Room at 9:00 a.m. After that, you will have the remainder of the day on your own. If you don't feel like taking in a show, the hotel has a very nice pool area and maybe we can do a little BBQ on the patio.
- **Thursday** will find us boarding coaches to go the Veterans Museum, followed by lunch in Old Downtown Branson. We will go back to the hotel to give people who want to change clothes for the evening activities. At 3:00 p.m. we will be at the gazebo on the Branson Belle grounds for our memorial ceremony, followed by dinner and show on the Belle while we cruise Table Rock Lake.
- **Friday**, of course, will be departure day for everyone who is not staying in Branson.

A note about the reunion activity package; I have asked Pam about variations for folks who want to make changes to the itinerary or attend only a portion of what is lined out for the group activities. Pam respectfully asks that there be none as that is a huge undertaking and she just can't do it. Collectively, Pam, Bob, and I put together something that will give everyone a chance to enjoy a variety of what Branson has to offer while trying to keep in mind limited individual funds. Those of you who have been to Branson know that there is a huge variety of shows and attractions available. So, we put in some "on your own" time to give everyone an opportunity to explore at their leisure. With that said, keep in mind the cost of transportation for Monday and Thursday is included in the package price (except tips for drivers and escorts) and the reduced admission costs for the shows/attractions that we are going to. If Bob and I were to put this together without Pam's assistance, the transportation costs alone would eat us up, not to mention the costs for entertainment. The hotel costs, on the other hand, would not be different.

The one caveat to all this is attendance to the memorial and dinner show on the Branson Belle. It is our understanding that there may be people who only want to come for that particular event, and that is fine. We have a block of 120 seats for dinner and show on the Belle. If the group totally fills those seats with reunion attendees, that will be awesome. If we need additional seats, please let us know well in advance and we will do everything we can to make additional reservations. Unfortunately, you may not be able to sit with the group.

Now, for those without internet access, here is your information for making reservations. Please keep in mind that you must make your own reservations for the hotel and, separately, for the activity package. In addition, you need to make separate payment to Richard for the Hospitality Room and Travel Assistance contributions.

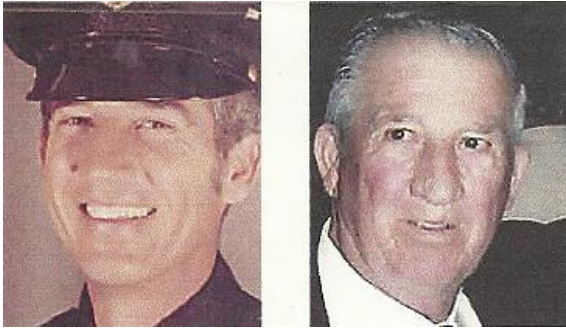

Dave Warrington

July 12, 1934 to January 7 2011

Dave Warrington died of a heart attack at age seventy-six on January 7, 2011. He was a native of Great Falls, Montana where he joined the Navy in 1951. After graduating from Great Lakes Illinois basic training, he served aboard the USS Walke as a boiler operator during the Korean War. He served three tours in the combat zone as part of Task Force 77.

Following his service, he worked for the Great Falls Brewery and became the youngest 1st Class Boiler Engineer in Montana at that time. In 1968, he joined the Great Falls Police Department. He began as a court officer and then went to the detective division. Dave became the Chief of Detectives and retired from the department in 1997.

Dave was a member of VFW Post 1087. He enjoyed hunting, fishing, golf, yard work and carpentry, especially helping his kids with their homes. Dave and his wife, Midge, were married for thirty-three years. They had a blended family of five children. All of them thought of Dave as their hero. Dave and Midge enjoyed travel, especially going to Navy Reunions where they were regular attendees. Dave was grateful for the opportunity to visit with those old and new Navy friends.

Friends of Dave knew him to be a man of outstanding character who was devoted to his profession, family and friends. An online guest book for Dave brought tributes from all over the country and one from Canada. Tributes came from judges, policemen, friends and shipmates. Midge says she received so many messages that told stories about Dave that were heartfelt, heroic and funny. Dave will be missed at our reunions but his friends will remember his delightful stories, his friendship and his smile. We all hope that Midge will be attending the Walke Reunions. There are many good friends to welcome her.

Shore Patrol Duty in A Japanese Whorehouse

The only time I was ever in a whorehouse was in Sasebo, Japan, when I was assigned to one as a Shore Patrol petty officer to keep the peace.

It was during the Korean War in February 1951; my ship, USS *Walke* (DD-723), was anchored in the bay near the naval base. We were between attacks on North Korea and in port to replenish ammunition and food. As usual, sailors from all the ships in harbor had liberty, and as usual, every ship whose crews had liberty had to provide petty officers for Shore Patrol.

As a Petty Officer 2/c, I was selected. SPs wore dress blues—it was winter—complete with ribbons, a duty belt, and an SP brassard around our right arm, and carried a billy.

When we reported to the Lieutenant in charge, we had no choice of duty; we were assigned. I was sent to the whorehouse. At least, it was inside work and warm; some SPs had to patrol the streets and the bars along the waterfront, cold duty.

My duty station was in the lobby, a large circular room that housed tables, chairs, and a bar that served all kinds of alcoholic drinks. The women's rooms were along the periphery and opened into the lobby.

We didn't have the number system then, so I don't know how the men or the women kept track of who was next. No matter, my job was to make myself visible, to stroll through the lobby and near the bar to make the sailors, soldiers, and Marines aware of my presence.

The evening went quietly. Then, just before midnight, I heard louder voices and noticed a crowd of soldiers, sailors, and Marines near the bar. I elbowed my way into the crowd, saying, "Shore Patrol; give way."

In the center of the crowd, I found two sailors on the floor, throwing punches at each other, though

not very well because they were both too drunk to be effective.

I said, "Shore Patrol," and grabbed the one on top and pulled them apart. That ended the fight.

I looked at the sailor on the floor and started. He was my college classmate. With bleary eyes, he tried to focus on me. When he recognized who I was, he became alert and said, "Are you going to tell my Mother where you found me?" "If you behave yourself," I said, "I won't."

He behaved himself, but I had to keep reminding him that I was on duty, and that he should let me alone. The rest of the evening was uneventful.

At 2 A.M., the bar and whorehouse closed, and my SP duty ended, so I returned to the SP office to check out for the night and return to my ship.

I served the USS *Walke* from 1964 until 1968 as a Fire Control Tech. Made three cruises on her and am glad to say I sailed with the best. Seems funny after awhile you sort of get attached to a ship and hate to see her go. I loved serving on *Walke* on *The Wild Side*. Commander Thompson always had our theme song played when we pulled along side for more fuel, or ammo, or food. My best story was when the ship had a fire as we were leaving for WestPac on my second cruise. My buddy and I, Jeff Davis, decided to have all our hair cut off for the start of the cruise. The fire forced us back to the ship yard to repaint the engine room and there we were getting liberty with no hair for about three weeks. Then we had to run like hell to catch up with the rest of the squad, just made stops long enough for fuel and food, and back out to sea. She was a great ship and I still love her, and talk proud about serving on her. I live in Missouri so I think I'll try to get down to Branson for the next reunion. Keep up the good work.

2012 Reunion from Alan Fear

I just wanted you to know that I have been receiving information from the Phoenix and Tucson CVB's along with some of the hotels. It looks like we can get rates from \$80 to \$110 per night if we schedule before October. So I'm looking at the last week in September (keeping in mind the heat during that time of year) and maybe even a shorter reunion time (4 instead of 5 days) to try and keep costs down. Both areas look good, but I'm leaning toward Tucson. Maybe you have some suggestions. Anyway, this is just a note to let you all know that things are starting to "pop" for 2012. There are no barnacles growing on this ole steamer.

OPERATION WIGWAM-Could You Have A Radiation Claim?

In the last newsletter, I asked for stories from shipmates who were on board May 14, 1955 when The Walke participated in Operation Wigwam. I did receive some stories but not much from Wigwam participants. Thanks to those who responded in any way.

Operation Wigwam involved a single test of the Mark 90 Betty Nuclear Bomb. It was conducted on May 14, 1955, about 500 miles southwest of San Diego. 6,800 personnel aboard 30 ships were involved in *Wigwam*. The purpose of *Wigwam* was to determine the vulnerability of submarines to deeply-detonated nuclear weapons, and to evaluate the feasibility of using such weapons in a combat situation. The task force commander, Admiral John Sylvester, was embarked on the task force flagship USS Mount McKinley AGC7.

For many years all personnel involved were sworn to secrecy about the test, however that ban has been lifted now and you are free to discuss and file claims for compensation or pension. We have done a lot of research on this, have talked with various VA and DAV representatives and there is some hope for help. Much that I've read suggests that you should file with your DAV representative at your VA hospital. We've done that and have received a letter acknowledging receipt of the application. That's where we are at the present time. Our DAV rep seemed confident Billy would be able to get SOME compensation. We'll see.

What health conditions are we talking about? Any kind of cancer, skin disorders, or anything that you have no answers for such as heredity. So many conditions have been mentioned including changes in your DNA. This would mean your children could also suffer from the results of the radiation.

We're going to open up our lives here for you

and list some of the occurrences in our own lives.

Billy has had several melanomas removed and, on each of his at least twice yearly visits to the dermatologist he has 5-10 moles/pre-cancerous/spots removed from his body. He has a psoriasis-like skin condition. In 1997 he suffered a heart attack and had open heart surgery resulting from Coronary Artery Disease, he has since had 3 stents. At the age of 60 he was forced into retirement on disability due to depression/nervous condition. He has less than half normal hearing and has suffered from anemia periodically.

I have found some information about the danger of Ionizing Radiation to the heart and heart vessels. Most refer to the damage done to the inside of the blood vessels and how later in life the plaque attaches to the vessel because the natural resistance to such build-up has been damaged by the radiation. Even people with hereditary vascular problems are at increased risk. I have not yet done extensive research on this.

In addition to the above, we're now wondering about our children. If the DNA can be altered, then just maybe that explains our 3rd child being born with Microcephaly (mental retardation), our oldest daughter's first child lived only 3 days after birth, her 2nd child has never been diagnosed but her learning abilities are borderline. Our 4th child's only son has Aspergers Syndrome. AND several years ago, our oldest daughter lost all her hair for a duration of 8 years and it's now happening again.

Maybe not because of DNA alteration, but maybe lingering effects of radiation, our 2nd child, a son, at the age of approximately 50 suffered from lymphoma.

These are the kinds of things I wanted to bring together. But above all, if you were involved in Wigwam, please file a claim with your DAV rep. Most say VA will not help you though I'm sure this can't always be the case. Without claims, nothing will be done. If you were there, our rep said you should file a claim. I realize that some of you have

been told they can't locate your records. Maybe this has changed. When Billy filed his claim, the rep, found him in about 1 minute and showed him where his ship was located in the test.

There is now a special committee headquartered in Mississippi which only works with radiation claims. File your claim with your DAV rep.

Richard Williamson is Walke's Secretary/Treasurer, communicator, researcher, consultant, website manager and all around good guy. He keeps the Walke Association together. Mary Lou is his sidekick, his wife of 47 years, and the mother of their four children. Richard was born May 1, 1934 in Kimberly Wisconsin, one of six children. In high school, he chaired a homecoming float committee and was senior class president. After graduation, the navy was next on his agenda. When boot camp was completed, he attended Machinery Repair School in San Diego. He then boarded the Walke and remained there until discharged in 1957. While aboard, he earned the rank of MR2.

At age twelve Richard began working in the greenhouse-floral business. He continued this work after his naval discharge, also doing grounds maintenance. His next twenty eight years were spent at a Kimberly Clark Paper Mill where he became supervisor of maintenance. Side jobs included grounds keeping and silk and wood fiber floral arrangements. In his spare time, along with family and friends, he built the family 2000 sq.ft. Home in Little Chute, Wisconsin.

Health problems sent Richard to doctors and neurologists who diagnosed him with Lou Gehrig's Disease (ALS) and Peripheral Neuropathy. He was told to get his affairs in order and expect to be in a wheelchair in three to six months. His life expectancy was three to five years. This was seventeen years ago. Richard has a lot to live for so he became a researcher and a man of determination. He began a routine of ginseng, vitamins and supplements, carefully documenting all results. While Richard says his routine may not help everyone, it cannot hurt either. Richard mentors many ALS and PN patients via the Internet and he speaks to groups. He can be reached at rwilliamson@new.rr.com. Today he feels better than he did thirteen years ago with a slow progression of the disease. He says, **“To fight any disease: a good positive, emotional, spiritual and healthy attitude is part of what you need.”** continued.....

The Walke Association is a mission for Richard with communication as the key word. He keeps in touch with all military publications and Websites, always seeking new ideas to improve the Walke Association. He e-mails and phones shipmates, especially those who have not attended a reunion for a while. He tries to reply to emails within 24 hours BUT the subject line must read **WALKE**. His first reunion was in 1999 and he has been a regular since that time. The Williamsons and Herb Carlson hosted the Green Bay reunion. In 2004 Richard told Mary Lou that he was taking the Walke's sec/treas job for two years. He has set up a Website (his kids helped). It has been opened more than 25,863 times, and averages 107 hits daily. The Website address is usswalke.org.

Mary Lou Mows the lawn and is Richard's driver while he rides shotgun and mans the GPS. They visit friends before and after reunions, enjoying their travel experience to the hilt. In March of 2011, they will spend a month in Orange Beach, Alabama.

When they return home to Little Chute, their six grandchildren will welcome them. Mary Lou will probably mow the lawn before hitting the golf course (she has made TWO holes-in-one) and get to work on her next Walke Silent Auction craft item. The Williamson's plant a large flower garden with three tomato plants. Richard will make floral arrangements, play golf, attend support groups and search the Internet for health solutions to help others and for ideas to make the Walke Association the best it can be.

Our hats are off to Richard Williamson, a man of many talents. He is a man of caring, sharing and dedication. In the spirit of communication, let's all reach out and contact a fellow sailor to attend the reunion in Branson.
